A Look at... NYC Justice Corps

Many things distinguish the Bronx from other boroughs and towns in the United States. Consider the New York Yankees, "Bronx cheers," (does anyone know why they are named that?) and the fact that we are the only borough of New York City that is part of the mainland of the United States. Some of our most dubious distinctions, however, include the story of our past, i.e., the "Burning Bronx," and the high number of our young people, mostly men, involved with the criminal justice system beginning at a young age. One new program, funded by the New York City Center for Economic Opportunity (CEO), and a joint collaboration of CEO, New York City Department of Corrections, John Jay College of Criminal Justice, Bedford Stuyvesant Restoration Corporation (service provider in Brooklyn) and Phipps Community Development Corporation (service provider in the Bronx), stands out from the rest in its multi-pronged approach to working with these young people.

[NYC Justice Corps](#) combines youth development, community development, workforce development and supportive services and serves young people, 18-24. In order to be eligible, participants must live in zip codes 10451, 10452, 10453, 10454, 10455, 10456, 10457, 10458, 10459, 10460, 10472 or 10474 **AND** fit one or all of the following criteria:

- released from jail or prison within the last year
- recently completed or enrolled in an alternative to incarceration program
- currently on probation or parole

The goals of the program are 1) to reduce recidivism, 2) to increase employment and/or education opportunities for participants, and 3) to foster community development in participants' communities.

The young adults go through three Phases in the program. In Phase I, the service provider (Phipps in the Bronx and Bed Stuy Restoration in Brooklyn) provides job training and skill-building, preparing participants for Corps "service" and long-term employment. This Phase builds teamwork, communicates the Justice Corps mission and lasts approximately three weeks. Phase II lasts at least three months, and participants contribute in a meaningful way to their home neighborhood through identification and execution of local community benefit projects. In Phase III, which lasts a minimum of 6 weeks, participants enter paid internships in public and private sector organizations that provide marketable job skills, work histories and build social networks.

Throughout the phases, participants receive a stipend of \$8-9/hour, support services which include job coaching, counseling, education services, and other resources. Upon graduation, participants are provided with job and/or educational placement and receive retention services for up to six months. In Kareem Fahim's article about the program in the NY Times, "[Seeking to Intervene With Young Adults Before Crime Becomes a Way of Life,](#)" the program is described as "a hybrid of the national youth corps movement, the Depression-era program that put young people to work on community projects, and more traditional post-prison programs that help former inmates find work, shelter and education."

While many participants are mandated to apply for NYC Justice Corps by their Probation or Parole Officers, many apply on their own, anxious to change the trajectory of their lives and establish a foundation for themselves for a better life. Acceptance into the Corps is random and determined by an outside agency. Enrollment for the fifth cohort, which begins June 17th, is going on now. Screening and enrollment will occur the week of June 8th.
